What is Virtual Reality?

Virtual Reality (VR) is the description given to a three-dimensional, computer generated environment (often online game) which can take the user/player anywhere using special goggles (VR Headsets) which are placed over the eyes, fully immersing the user in the 'virtual environment' allowing exploration and interaction.

Extra interaction with the virtual environment can be further enhanced with the use of hand controllers and/or gloves with sensors.

VR enables the user to learn about different places, ideas and scenarios by experiencing them as if the user were actually there.

The 4 main characteristics of VR:

Believable: What you see and hear makes you feel that you are actually there

Fully immersive: What you see changes as it would in real life as you move your head around with the VR headset on.

Computer-generated: Complex 3D computer graphics are created in the VR world that change in real time as the user moves their head.

Interactive: The user will be able to interact with different objects in the scene, pressing a button or opening a door.

Potential Risks:

Parents/carers may not be able to see or hear what their child is experiencing when participating in online games wearing VR headsets and need to be aware of the potential risks.

The Digital Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS)
Committee has recently published a report which highlights the risks online influencer culture poses to children.

Findings include:

- posting content about children online can affect their privacy and present security risks;
- child influencers can be at risk of exploitation;

Recommendations include:

- support for parents and schools in developing young people's media literacy;
- new legislation that protects child influencers.

Parents need to know that BeReal is a social media app for iOS and Android devices.

BeReal allows children to:

- post a photo once a day that will be shared with friends they are linked to
- respond to posts by using selfies they have taken that show different expressions
- view photos from other users they do not know who have shared them in a public feed and *friend* those users
- use the app to send them notifications to be able to download and use it

NB. Recommended Age: 13+

Warning - Posts do not appear to be screened, so there may be a chance content that is not child-friendly could be shared.
